### How Does United Way Work?

### How Much Of My Donation Goes To Direct Services?

### What Agencies Can Receive My Gift?

- The "Community Impact Fund" on the back of your pledge card supports all the services in the county in which you live and work. Example: If you select the Community Impact Fund and you live and work in Flathead County your gift will go only to the Flathead County section of the brochure.
- You can direct your donation to be designated to one or more agencies of your choice on the back of your United Way pledge card. You can choose United Way Community Impact agencies or services in Lake, Lincoln, Sanders or Glacier Counties or Local Affiliated Agencies, or any of the Montana Shares agencies or any other non-profit of your choice with a valid IRS 501(c)3.

### Who Decides Where & How Much Agencies Receive If I Choose The Community Impact Fund?

Community Impact Agencies receive donor designated gifts at 100% of your donation. The balance of the Community Impact Fund goes towards supporting agencies under this category. Local volunteers help determine where the dollars you donate are spent. This year 50 community members participated in the local process to give their input.

### How Do I Check The Status And/Or Verify If My Designated Agency Has Received My Gift?

Designated agencies receive the designation information from donors so they can thank you for your gift, unless you indicate a wish to remain anonymous. 

### 2018 UNITED WAY COMMUNITY IMPACT AGENCIES

Northwest Montana United Way - Serves Flathead, Lake, Lincoln, Glacier, and Sanders Counties. Provides services and programs to assist agencies based on current community needs.

<u>Abbie Shelter/Violence Free Crisis Line</u> - Promotes safety, independence and empowerment to survivors of domestic and sexual violence through emergency shelter, 24-hour crisis hotline, legal advocacy, and mental health services.

<u>Big Brothers Big Sisters</u> - Matches youth with carefully screened mentors in life-transforming friendships that promote positive social, emotional, and behavioral growth.

<u>Boy Scouts</u> - We prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law.

<u>CASA For Kids</u> - Community volunteers trained as guardian ad litem's advocate for children who are in the court system due to abuse or neglect.

<u>Flathead Food Bank</u> - Provides emergency food assistance to families experiencing food insecurity. Our pantries or mobile bus serve everyone that winds up at our door in need.

<u>Flathead Youth Home</u> - Crisis stabilization in a home-like setting for youth, ages 10-18, due to circumstances which put themselves or the community at risk.

<u>Fox Creek Group Home</u> - This program provides treatment to assist adults in managing their mental illness in order to live independently in the community.

<u>Girl Scouts</u> - Every K-12 Girl is welcome. We build girls of courage, confidence, and character, who make the world a better place.

<u>Head Start</u> - Early childhood services to limited-income children and families through education, health, disability, and social services. Centers: Kalispell, North Valley (Columbia Falls, Canyon, Whitefish), Eureka.

<u>Literacy Center of Northwest Montana</u> - Promotes literacy and provides individualized learning programs for adults and children. Our goal is to empower participants seeking social, professional and life-long learning skills.

Mental Health Crisis Line - Provides crisis intervention by licensed mental health professionals by responding 24 hours a day to mental health emergencies within the community.

<u>Nurturing Center</u> - A comprehensive family resource center strengthening families by offering education, support groups, mentors, home visiting, supervised parenting, nutrition, childcare assistance, and provider training.

<u>Samaritan House</u> - Serves individuals and families in Northwest Montana who are homeless and persons needing transitional living with the basic needs of food, shelter, and clothing.

<u>Special Friends Advocacy</u> - Provides volunteer services to persons with developmental disabilities, self-advocacy, assistance with daily living needs, advocacy, diversity education and experience, social activities, transportation, and community awareness.

<u>Summit Independent Living</u> - Advance the independence and civil rights of people with disabilities by building awareness and advocating positive change in our communities.
